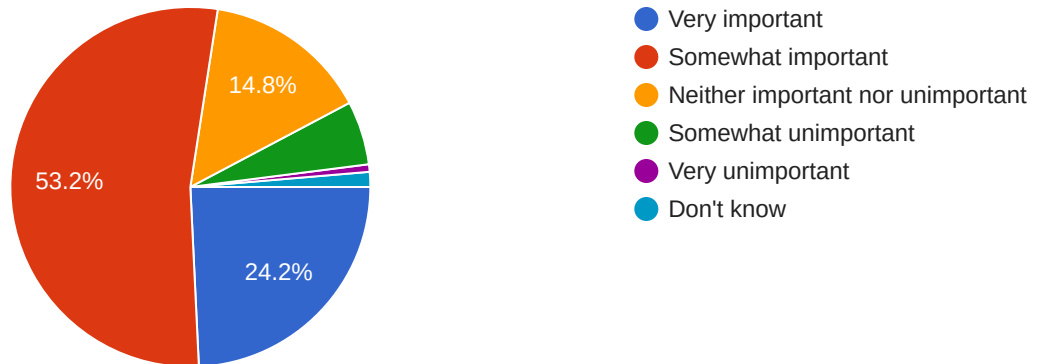

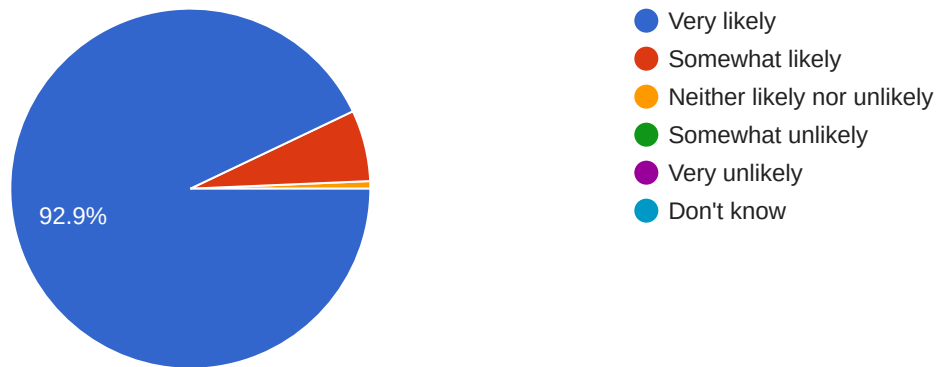
How important are your current grades for your future plans?

How likely are you to choose a university degree?

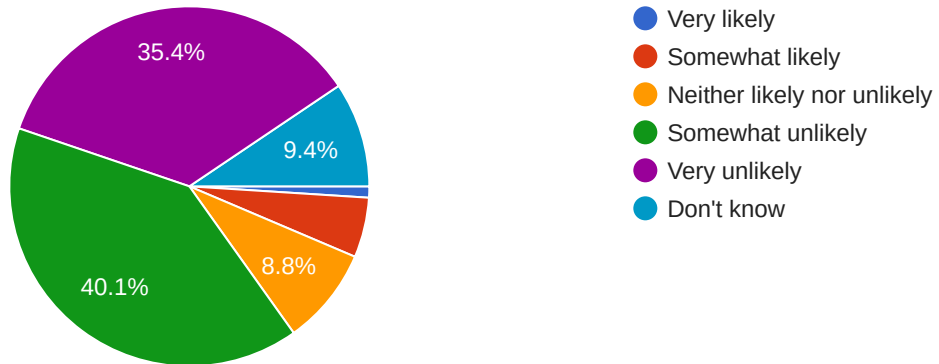

**Note:** This is not surprising at all, considering that Eötvös is one of the most prestigious high schools in Hungary.

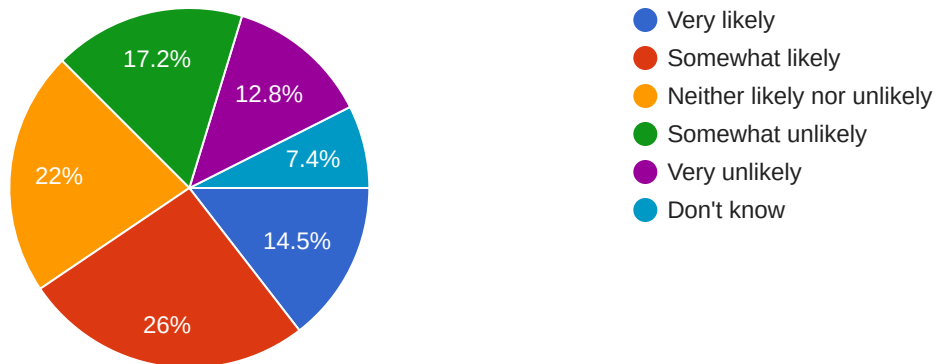
### How likely are you to take a gap year?

### About taking a gap year, then studying abroad - analysis

Only 19 people (6.40%) were “Very likely” or “Somewhat likely” to take a gap year. We expected to see a correlation between this and wanting to study abroad for two reasons:

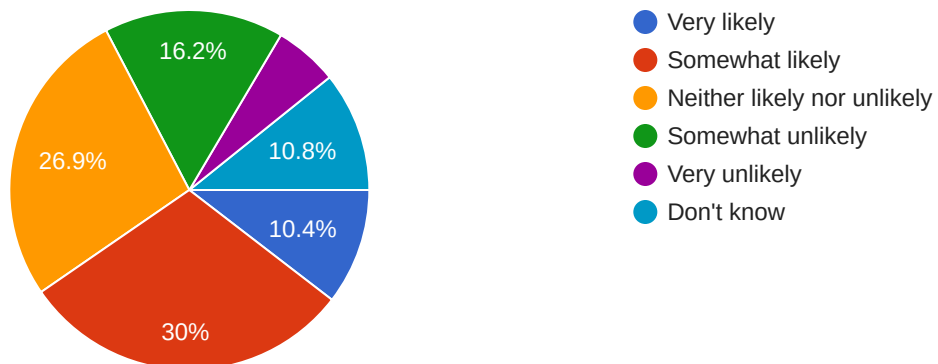
- As we learned from past conferences, gap years are a lot more common in Western Europe, so in Hungary, taking a gap year might require more openness toward this culture, in turn making it more likely that one is planning to study abroad.
- Many universities abroad require documents for the admission that Hungarian students simply don't get until after the deadline, so some students might opt to spare the complications, emails, and additional documents, and simply wait a year to be able to apply for courses in other countries.

We were surprised to see that out of those 19 people, only 11 were “Very likely” or “Somewhat likely” to study abroad, while the remaining 8 weren't.

However, among those who don't plan to take a gap year, 109 people plan to study abroad, while 169 don't. This means that even though there wasn't an overwhelming majority of abroad-ers among the ones that plan to take a gap year, planning to take a gap year still means that you are a lot more likely (39.21% => 57.89%!) to plan to study abroad. Our suspicion of a correlation was correct, even if on a lot less impressive scale than we expected.

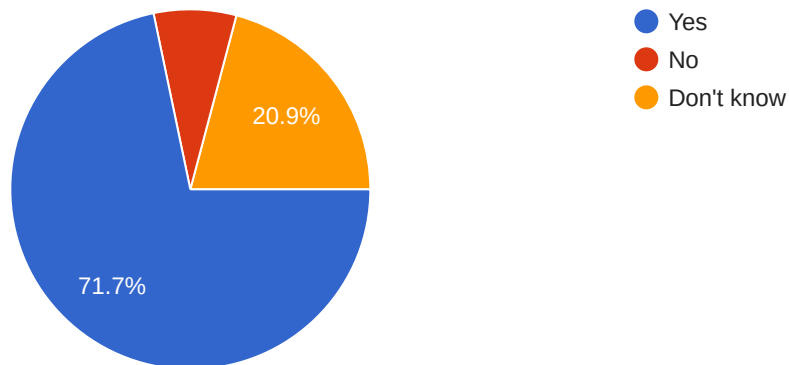
### How likely are you to move to another country for work?

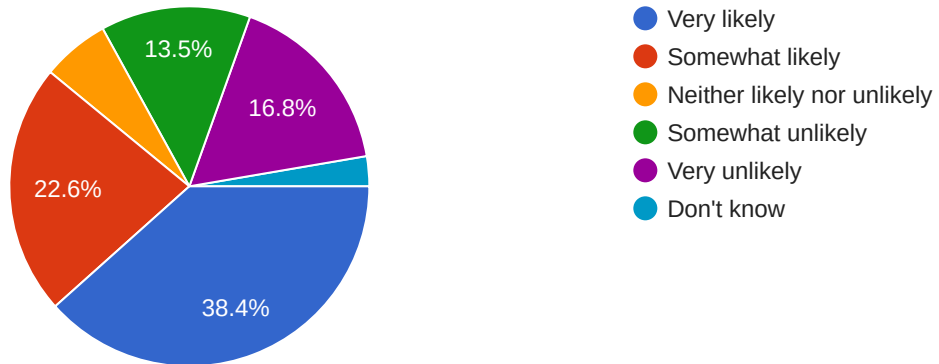
### About going abroad - analysis

Out of 297 answers, there were 70 (23.57%), where we deemed the respondent's views and plans about going abroad "inconsistent". This means that one of the two following cases applied:

- They explicitly see better/more opportunities abroad, but neither of their answers for studying and working abroad were "Very likely" or "Somewhat likely". There were 64 of these respondents, and this is the more understandable option: maybe their social net, their local responsibilities of their families are holding them back.
- They don't see better/more opportunities abroad (or don't know), but at least one of their answers for studying and working abroad were "Very likely" or "Somewhat likely". Only 6 people (2.02%) responded this way, our best guess is that these answers are due to a misunderstanding or the respondent not paying enough attention. However, if anyone has any rational explanation, we would love to hear it during the conference.

### How likely are you to take the same path as your parents did, education wise?

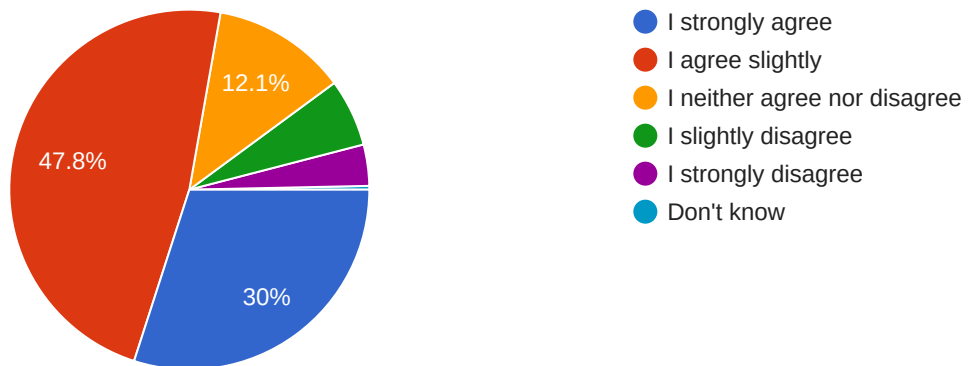

### How much do you agree with the following statements?

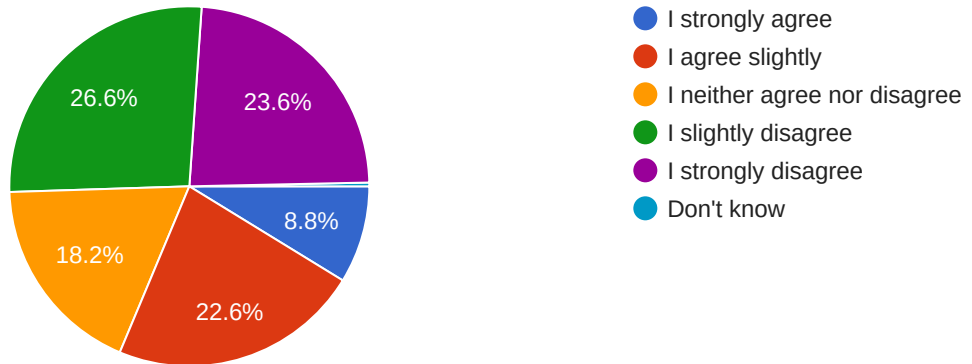
My parent's opinion about my education matters to me.
